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#### **ROUTE DESCRIPTION**

1. From Westminster Lodge, join the footpath, running parallel to the car park entry road you have just driven up. Turn left keeping all car parks to your left. Pass the athletics track on your left and at the first Y junction bear left going slightly uphill. At the next cross path, turn left, walking up hill passing on you're right the remains of the Roman City Wall.

## QUESTION 1: What is depicted on the 1st Verulamium Park information board?

2. Continue to the end of the footpath, crossing the small footbridge to reach King Harry Lane. Cross the road immediately at the crossing and turn right. At the next pedestrian crossing, cross back over, keeping park on your right and continue to the roundabout, A4147, Brewhouse Hill. Turn right. \*\*At the second pedestrian crossing, cross the road, turn right and then first left onto Gorhambury Drive, a permissive path. \*\*(On certain days including Saturdays, Gorhambury Drive, a permissive path, has planned closures to the public. Details of these closure's will be posted on the website one month beforehand so please check before attending. https://www.gorhamburyestate.co.uk) \*\*Go to Section 3.

The footpath/Drive entrance is just past the ticket office on the right (a small Green Metal Gate, open 09.00 to 18.00 hrs). If you wish to enter the Roman Theatre entry is £3.00 for adults. Continue along Gorhambury Drive / Walk, for approximately 1200 metres and turn right on the gravel track / road. (There is a no exit sign on the right). Cross the River Ver remaining on the track / road to the right, go through gate, bear left until you reach the main road, turn right, A5183. (Watling Street, this is the Old Roman Road).

# QUESTION 2: What is the name of the restaurant/pub on your right, on this road, and what is sitting on top of the hat on the sign?

\*\*If Gorhambury Drive is shut, continue on the same side of the road and turn right into St Michaels Street. 8km alternative route\*\*

- 3. Continue along this road to the roundabout, cross road with care using the island, and turn right downhill, until you get to St Michaels Street, \*\*turn left, passing the school on your right, immediately turn right towards St Michaels Church, signposted Roman Verulamium. St Michaels church yard has a footpath, made of headstones, going around it if you wish to explore. The road bears left and as you enter the carpark, (alternative start location including coach park.) Verulamium Museum is on your left. continue, passing free public toilets on left, into the park until you reach The Inn on The Park (Cafe). From the far side of the Inn, turn right following a footpath past the play park on your left going past planters and a hedge on the right. Follow the sign to the Roman Mosaic. This is opened daily but the mosaic can still be seen through the windows if shut.
- 4. Return back along the same footpath, continue passing The Inn now on your left. Pass the splash park on your right, follow the paths keeping left at each junction, until you exit the park. Turn right on St Michaels Street. Crossing the Bridge of Kingsbury, the oldest bridge in Hertfordshire and with the Watermill and Waffle House on the left. Turn right onto Fishpool Street and continue up the hill. At the junction with Welclose Street on the left, turn right, No Entry Signs, pass St Albans Boys school. Follow the path round to the right walking through the archway into Abbey Mill Lane. (You will return to the Abbey later) Go to the bottom of the hill taking the right fork, until you reach, Ye Olde Fighting Cocks Public House. Turn left beside the Pub, just before a footbridge across some water.

QUESTION 3: Why was the Olde Round House re-built after 1599?

- 5. Continue from the Pub, turning part left along the tarmacked path in the park, uphill to St Albans Abbey, where there is a shop, refectory, and toilets inside. If not visiting the abbey turn left and follow path to end of building. Turn right across the front / west door.
- 6. After exploring the Abbey, head to the west exit, located opposite the archway in Abbey Mill Lane. Go through a small metal gate, with a white house to your right, including Romeland Cottage. At end turn right, George Street, which then becomes the High Street. At the pedestrian crossing, cross to the Clock Tower (on your right) in French Row.

### QUESTION 4: What is written on the door of the tower next to the French Row Road sign?

(There are numerous old buildings, shops and eateries in the town centre. Wednesday and Saturday are Market days.)

7. Continue up French Row, turning right when you get to the St Albans Museum and Gallery on your right. A large white building. (This used to be the old court room and there is a café seating area located inside the old court room, as well as toilet facilities located in unusual places and a shop. There are literature booklets inside the café giving a more detailed information regarding some of the court history and the cases held there.)

When you exit, keep the Museum on your right, walk around the building, heading down the hill Chequer Street, to the traffic lights. Cross at the junction and continue in the same direction down Holywell Hill.

Cross at the next pedestrian crossing opposite Café Rouge. (Former Ryders Seed Hall). Continue downhill, turning left into Sopwell Lane. (The Goat Inn Public House, is located on the left and is reputed to be the oldest Brothel in St Albans).

### QUESTION 5: What is on the name plate above the door of number 73 Sopwell Lane?

8. Continue until you come to a mini roundabout, turn right onto Cotton Mill Lane, passing the St Albans City Baths. Cross at the pedestrian crossing and continue on the road, in the same direction, over the River Ver and Old Sopwell Gardens. On your left is the Sopwell Nunnery ruins. (Sopwell Priory also known as Sopwell nunnery, was built in 1140 by the Benedictine abbot of St Albans Abbey, Geoffrey Gorham).

### QUESTION 6: How many round windows are visible in the ruins?

9. Return to Cotton Mill Lane, cross over the road turning right back towards the St Albans City Baths. Turn left along the river Ver trail, down some steps, keeping the City Baths to your right and river to your left until you cross at a small metal bridge. (If this trail path is flooded you can continue past The Nunnery and turn right onto Prospect Road, Continue to Holywell Hill.) At the end of the path, cross Holywell Hill at the crossing and return to the car park.
